Counsel for a Greek-born war bride and mother of two children went before Judge George C. Sweeney in federal court today seeking to cancel denaturalization proceedings against her and her deportation to her native country on grounds she held membership in the Com-munist Party.

About 50 police and volunteers took part in the woods hunt today. A family friend, Col. Rex Gargaforer Army intelligence of ficer, was one of the searchers. The girl has been nervous and under a doctor's care for several months, her mother said, and had been advised to devote less time to academic activities in the interest of her health.
