Secretary of State John Foster Dulles in a major policy speech to the American Bar Association this afternoon, called for revision of the "pre-atomic age" United Nations Charter.

He declared the Charter was actually "obsolete" when it was drawn up at the San Francisco Conference in 1945 and contains "serious inadequacies."

Warned Not to Marry Vermont Man, 40, Slain 3 Days Before Wedding

SHARON, Vt., Aug. 26 (UP)—A farmer's partly-burned body was found tied to rafters in an abandoned schoolhouse today—just three days before his scheduled wedding day—and authorities believed he had been slain by masked men who warned him recently not to get married.

Investigators said it would take at least two strong men to place the body of Frank Krivak, 40, of Sharon high on the rafters where it was found. They believed a blow on the head caused death. There was a gash behind one ear.

Neighbors reported that two masked men threatened Krivak recently and warned him not to go through with his plans to marry Marion Minor, 32, of Windsor next Saturday.

Authorities said the dead man's fiancée had been taken into protective custody.

Krivak's body was discovered by his brother, John, 35, while the latter was passing the schoolhouse near the family's farm. Authorities said gasoline-soaked rags near the body apparently had been set fire but for some reason had not burned.

The victim did not return home last night.

Storm Tremor Injures Three in Newton Plant

NEWTON, Aug. 26—Three persons suffered minor injuries when a plate glass window was blown in at the J. M. McManus company ice cream plant at 244 Needham st. during a brief, sharp thunderstorm early this afternoon.

The injured were Mrs. Pauline Eldredge and Mrs. Alice Fontannay, employees of the nearby Deerfoot Farm Milk Company plant, and John Tedeschi, a construction worker at the General Motors plant. They were taken to Newton-Wellesley Hospital.

There were 16 employees and customers in the plant store when a combination of wind and concussion from a lightning bolt blasted the window from its frame.

NEW YORK, Aug. 26—Pretty Mildred McDonald of Somerville, Mass., stood on a brass-railed platform at Manhattan Police Headquarters this morning.

She is one of seven children of Alfred J. McDonald, a printing teacher at Somerville's Northeastern Junior High School. Her mother was also a teacher before her marriage.



Mildred was the girl friend of Mary DiRocco's oldest brother, Joseph, until a year ago. She and Joseph broke up their close friendship several months before his marriage to another woman last April.

"I'm sorry for all the damage brought on my family," says Mildred McDonald in confession which police say she made this morning.

It has been a police theory that sadness over the separation and Joseph's subsequent wedding deepened into a disturbed mental state which led to Monday's fatal shooting of Joseph's little sister.

Mildred was picked up last night by a Times sq. traffic policeman, who recognized her from a newspaper photograph.

Bar Association Approves Blast at "Book Burning"

The policy-making body of the American Bar Association went firmly on record today as being opposed to "book burning" in all its forms and upheld the freedom of Americans to read.

The 224 member House, with six members from Massachusetts, unanimously approved a resolution that:

"The freedom to read is a corollary of the Constitutional guarantee of freedom of the press and American lawyers should oppose efforts to restrict it."

Attacks on the presence of certain books in government libraries abroad "are often made by zealous and well-meaning people, in the name of national security... it is right that we should speak plainly now about these developments."

The A. B. A. group conceded that the government "may properly restrict" the contents of its libraries abroad which present a picture of American life and culture.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26 (AP)—The government reported today that living costs edged to a new record high in mid-July. The increase was enough to give 1,000,000 auto industry workers a 1-cent hourly pay boost.

It was the second straight time the cost index had risen.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics said its index, known as the "consumers price" index, reached 114.7, percent of the 1947-49 average. This is 2-10ths of 1 percent higher than in June.

She called the girl's 18-year-old brother, Warren, and he discovered his sister hidden behind a carefully screened cellar opening under the front porch of the house.

Police Chief Robert P. McEly said that the girl had taken a jar of water, almost all of which had been consumed, and a jar containing 48 sleeping pills with her into the off-basement hideout.

She was rushed to the Newton-Wellesley Hospital where she is recovering consciousness. Her condition is described as "suspicious." She is in no danger, hospital authorities said.

Chief McEly and a fellow officer, who had been searching garages and buildings within a one block radius of the Plath home, crawled into the narrow opening and helped Warren bring his sister into the cellar.

"We searched that cellar Monday night, or thought we did," McEly told the Globe. "Of course, there is a possibility that she might not have been there when we were. She had a blanket with her that was not reported as missing before she was found."

Chief McEly said the opening behind which Miss Plath had hidden herself had been carefully screened. She had evidently replaced bundles of firewood usually stored in the space.

The girl's mother, a Boston University professor, told the Globe yesterday that she believed her daughter had become dependent over a temporary inability to turn out creative writing.

Miss Plath, a brilliant student, had been contributing poetry and fiction to national magazines the past several years.

In recent weeks she had been experiencing difficulty in creating new works.

She recently felt she was unworthy of the confidence held for her by the people she knew," Mrs. Plath said. "For some time she has been unable to write either fiction or her more recent love, poetry."

Instead of regarding this as just an arid period that every writer faces at times, she believed something had happened to her mind that it was unable to produce creatively any more.

Rev. William Rice, pastor of the local Unitarian Church, the girl's mother, brother, and grandmother were closeted with the girl immediately after she was brought to the hospital.

The attractive girl, clad only in a strapless halter and abbreviated shorts, disappeared from her home at mid-afternoon Monday leaving a note for her mother stating that she had gone for a long walk and would return tomorrow.

The family reported her as "missing" shortly after 5 p. m. Monday and said that she had taken her handbag and a bottle containing about 50 sleeping pills with her.

Miss Plath had a slight bruise over one eye when she was found.

The girl's mother, a Boston University professor, told the Globe yesterday that she believed her daughter had become despondent over a temporary inability to turn out creative writing.

Miss Plath, a brilliant student, had been contributing poetry and fiction to national magazines the past several years.

In recent weeks, she had been experiencing difficulty in creating new works.

"She recently felt she was unworthy of the confidence held for her by the people she knew," Mrs. Plath said. "For some time she has been unable to write either fiction or her more recent love, poetry. Instead of regarding this as just an arid period that every writer faces at times, she believed something had happened to her mind; that it was unable to produce creatively any more."

Rev. William Rice, pastor of the local Unitarian Church, the girl's mother, brother, and grandmother were closeted with the girl immediately after she was brought to the hospital.

The attractive girl, clad only in a strapless halter and abbreviated shorts, disappeared from her home at mid-afternoon Monday leaving a note for her mother stating that she had gone for "a long walk" and would return "tomorrow."

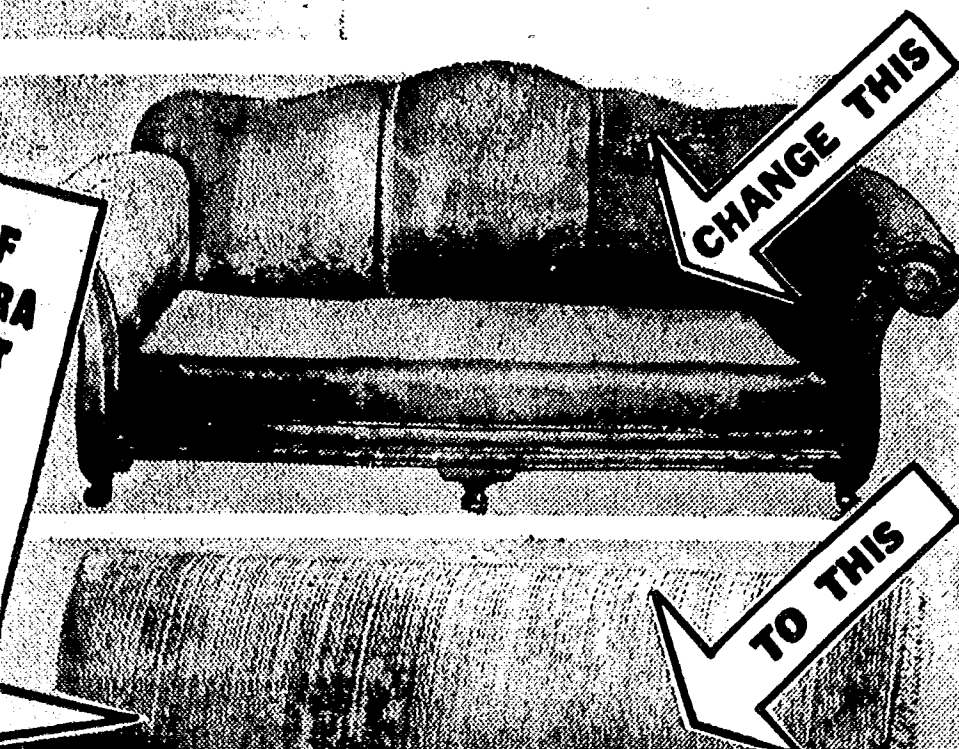
The family reported her as "missing" shortly after 5 p. m. Monday and said that she had taken her handbag and a bottle containing about 50 sleeping pills with her.
