### Yachtsmen Tow Quartet to Shore 4 Teen-Agers Adrift in Skiff All Night Safe

HARWICHPORT, Aug. 28—Four teen-agers, including a Wellesley Hills youth, missing off the Cape in a 13-foot outboard skiff since 5 p. m. last night, were located at 7:30 a. m. today by yachtsmen and taken in tow to Allen Harbor, Harwichport.

The group was greeted by their parents who had remained at the station all night. None required medical treatment but were wet, cold and hungry. They were taken to their homes.

The teen-agers were identified by Coast Guardsmen, who had been searching through the night, as John Rugo, 14, Wellesley Hills, owner of the boat, Robert Thompson, 17, of Jackson Heights, N. Y., Joan Lapham, 14, and Elizabeth Tatrick, 19.

The Boston District Coast Guard Headquarters said all are summer residents of Hyannisport and Dennisport.

Rescuing the quartet were John Doherty and Carleton Francis, both of West Harwich, who spotted the skiff about five miles west of Monomoy Island. The group had set out from Allen Harbor yesterday.

NEW YORK, Aug. 28 (AP)—A seaman reigned over a scene of confusion today by perching atop a 30-foot lamppost and demanding that somebody find his girl friend and bring her to him.

Christopher McDonald, 24, of New York, stayed aloft for an hour in a crow's nest, then finally shinned down at the entreaty of a priest.

By that time hundreds of pedestrians had gathered below him at 8th av. and 23d st. Thirty policemen arrived with nets. Traffic became snarled. Sleepy-eyed residents of nearby apartments, awakened by honking horns, screamed for quiet.

"Why don't you come down?" shouted patrolman Michael Littman.

### Second Flight of Giant Planes Reaches Tokyo

TOKYO, Aug. 28 (AP)—The United States Air Force said tonight that giant B-36 bombers flown to Japan this week under warlike secrecy, are teaming with other warplanes in a "realistic, combat-type" Far East exercise—within 700 miles of Vladivostok, a Russian stronghold base.

A mass flight of B-36's, capable of carrying atomic bombs anywhere in the world, landed near Tokyo Tuesday after a trail-blazing flight across the Pacific.

A second flight landed this morning for the exercise, dubbed "Operation Big Stick."

An official Far East Air Forces release said the huge bombers are "conducting an operational training exercise in the Far East" involving realistic combat-type training missions.

A veil of secrecy hung over the operation and the Air Force would not reveal either the number of planes in the exercise or its duration.

### U. S. Plan Voted on Korea Peace; India Withdraws

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Aug. 28 (AP)—The U. N. General Assembly today gave an overwhelming endorsement to an American backed plan for the Korean peace conference, despite vigorous Russian opposition.

The plan provides that only countries who fought under the U. N. banner should represent the world organization at the payley.

The vote was 43-5, with 10 abstaining. The Soviet bloc cast the negative vote. India did not participate.

India averted a certain defeat by withdrawing as a possible participant just before the voting began.

With United States backing, the Assembly recommended that Russia could take part in the conference, provided the other side desires it. This means that if Russia goes, she will have to sit on the Communist side with Red China and North Korea.

## N. H. Man Killed, Saugus Women Hurt in Crash

PORTSMOUTH, N. H., Aug. 28—A local man was killed and two Saugus, Mass. women were critically injured in a two-car collision on a spur road between Route 16 and the New Hampshire toll road here late last night.

George Garland, 33, of Columbia st., died three hours later at Portsmouth Hospital of a fractured skull and broken neck.

Taken to the same hospital in unconscious condition were Marion E. Lynch, 48, of 9 Wormstead st. and Dorothy Jean Perry 22, of 409 Central st., both Saugus, Mass.

The Perry woman sustained head injuries, compound fracture of the right leg and multiple cuts and bruises. The Lynch woman suffered compound fracture of the right leg, shock and multiple cuts and bruises.

Minutes after the crash a trailer truck struck the wreckage of the two cars but the operator, Grant Hickman of 97 Portland av., Dover, was not hurt.

He told police he was unable to see the cars through the heavy fog that hung over the section.

State Police officers were hampered in removing the victims by the dense fog combined with heavy traffic.

At that time she was clad in a white blouse and tan flair skirt. According to the family the girl is 5 feet 8 inches tall, weighs 150 pounds and has dark olive skin and light blond hair, cut in a long bob.

She was riding a girl's model bike with a Wellesley registration plate.

Penelope is due to enter the sophomore year at the Boston school where she is majoring in physical therapy.

A 26-year-old Philadelphia man who had been working at the Eastern Yacht Club with Penelope throughout the Summer told Marblehead police and the girl's parents last night that he would conduct a personal search for the missing girl.

Marblehead police said the man had promised to report anything he learned that might be helpful in locating her.

The girl's mother told the Globe that she last saw her daughter July 25.

"We were anxious about Penny because she had neglected to write or telephone us," Mrs. Protze said. "Her birthday comes next Monday and I wanted to give her a party. I put in a person-to-person call for her to the Eastern Yacht Club and learned then, for the first time, that she had quit her job last Monday. I later reached her by telephone at the home of her aunt."

Mrs. Protze received a telephone call at 3:30 a. m. this morning from the Philadelphia man.

"He told us that he had been looking for Penny all night in Lynn and Revere, but he had been unable to find her," she said.

 TIPPERARY, Aug. 28—Archbishop Richard J. Cushing left his band of pilgrims temporarily today to motor nearly 100 miles to Glanworth and Waterford to pay tribute to the memory of his parents.

Then he went to Waterford, not far away, where he visited the convent of the Trappistine nuns. There he presented them a purse to purchase a new organ in memory of his mother.

LYNN, Aug. 28—A juvenile ring believed responsible for the theft of several thousand dollars worth of automobile parts has been broken, police said today.

Eight youngsters, residents of Lynn and Saugus and ranging in ages from 16 to 14, were rounded up after one was collared by a Lynn policeman while allegedly stealing a car radio.

Police said the ring has been in operation for the last several weeks and that more than a dozen used-car dealers have been victimized.

A thorough search of the youngsters' homes is being made today by police who think they may recover some of the stolen parts.

According to police the ring operated this way.

One or two of the boys would go to a used car lot and remove some easily resalable part of a car. They would then hide it on the lot and return later to pick it up. In some instances they used an automobile to haul away their loot.

The first boy arrested was grabbed by Patrolman J. P. Caproni who answered a complaint of Albert Caproni, owner of a used car, and auto parts business on Western av., that some of his merchandise had been stolen.

While the officer was listening to the complaint, the boy allegedly appeared in another section of the yard and took a radio from a hiding place. He was nabbed and the other boys were rounded up later.

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The group is also linked with breaks in New Hampshire. The same burglary methods are followed, even to leaving a window open when they leave.

Cambridge Police Capt. Edward Maher, chief of detectives, planned an incessant vigil to track down the thieves. Three teams of investigators are working on a 24-hour basis. They are under the command of Sgts. Frederick Marcini, James Murphy and Thomas Toomey.

Officers have been given orders to seize all persons loitering near apartment buildings who cannot give a good account of their movements. Several such suspects have already been quizzed and eliminated, police declared.
