TESTS FOR SLAYER

Must Undergo Sanity Study In Killing of Somerville Girl

Thompson Says He Won't Ask For Death Chair

Two new moves are due in the case of Miss Mildred McDonald, pretty 25-year-old Somerville stenographer accused of shooting her ex-boy friend's kid sister.

1—THE MIDDLESEX County grand jury will convene Sept. 8 to indict gun-toting Mildred, now held without bail at the Cambridge jail.

2—She will be given sanity tests.

"Whether the grand jury will insist on returning a first degree murder indictment had become a major question in the case today.

Dist. Atty. George E. Thompson disclosed he would not ask for a first degree indictment.

HOWEVER, the decision is one which will be made by vote of the jurors, who may or may not follow the recommendation of a prosecutor during the grand jury's deliberations.

Thompson, taking the position that he would not press for a first degree murder indictment, said:

"I do not think that would be in the interest of justice. It is not a first degree murder case."

"It is a terrible tragedy that has struck two substantial families of the community."

Thompson's view of the matter may alter the police work on the case.

The vote was 415, with 10 abstentions. The Soviet bloc cast 17 votes.

Miss Protze was described in a police bulletin as an "attractive, blue-eyed blond with wavy hair; five feet, six and weighing 135 pounds."

She was wearing a white blouse and a tan flared skirt when she last was seen.

STAYING WITH AUNT

Miss Protze had been staying at the home of an aunt, Miss Emily Thorner, while working at the yacht club. She left Miss Thorner's home, presumably to go home, when she disappeared.

She rode a girl's model bicycle with a Wellesley registration plate.

U. N. Troops Capture 20 Teams Of Spies from North Korea

TOKYO (UP) — The Communists have sent "more than 14 miles behind the old battle line."

The sources said the new line probably is of great concern to the Reds, who know it was not built under pressure and therefore probably is much stronger than anything they have hit so far.

The spies posed as civilians fleeing from Communist rule in North Korea, reliable United Nations sources said. Most of them took orders from woman leaders.

United Nations troops saw through their scheme and captured them.

"Many of them confessed," the sources said.

Each spy team told the same story, that the North Koreans expect the U. N. "to violate the truce and resume military operations" in October.

Some even gave a specific date for the expected "U. N. violation." They said it would occur on Oct. 27, on the eve of the deadline for the convening of the Korean political conference.

Intelligence sources already had been considering October as a danger month because South Koreans returning to freedom from Red prison camps have sung songs with words to the effect that "we'll see you in October when the snow is flying."
